#### We Wait with Hope

I'm writing this on November 27<sup>th</sup> as I ponder the month ahead. There will be four Advent sermons, one Christmas Eve sermon, five worship bulletins, and five children's sermons. The sanctuary and church will be decorated, the banners hung, the visitors welcomed, the Advent and Christmas music sung by the choir and the people. The children will sing and gather in their costumes around the manger. There will be Silent Night with candles, pews filled to capacity, and joy. The Savior will be born again in our hearts. Each year we reenact the beauty of Christ's first coming. Our hearts are touched, and our faith increases. "Jesus did this for me," we remember. "How amazing that Jesus would take on our flesh, our limitations, and our struggles so that he could put us right with God!"

He will dwell with them; they will be his peoples, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away." And the one who was seated on the throne said, "See, I am making all things new."

We wait with hope as we long for Christ's return. Even so, come Lord Jesus. Amen and amen.

## Writer's Corner...

#### Cold December, Warm Hearts

In cold December our hearts become warmer. Isn't that ironic? We talk about feeling miserable in the cold, yet this is perhaps the month when we are at our most high in spirits, generosity, love AND FELLOWSHIP.. This is the time of the year when even the most 'Bah Humbugged' shows spirits of kindness and generosity. We give more to the beggar on the streets, when we would avoid a relative, we send a Christmas Card or Christmas Letter. We greet each other — including strangers - with a cheery smile and a Happy Holiday/Merry Christmas. And, during December (some might have even started long before) we start the preparations for the Christmas dinner, we decorate the Christmas tree, buy presents, wrap them, and wait patiently for the morning when they will be opened. Like the song Jingle Bells, there are "children laughing, people passing, meeting smile after smile." December is heart-warming after all. But there is more to it. Hope- The dawn of a new beginning; renewed Optimism and Faith

Peace- Symbolizing Tranquility and Serenity \_ the basis of Faith and a Testimony of God's Grace.

Joy- Infusing the hearts of all with Jubilation and Gladness.

**Love**- The sense of Compassion and Devotion infusing our hearts with unconditional Love and Grace. God is Love, and we are to "love our neighbors as ourselves."

We remember too that God's love was extended to us (still is) when He came in human form as the baby Jesus. He came to take us out of the darkness and gloom of our lives, to renew our joy and gladness, to help us fulfill our hopes for the future, and to spread peace in the world. The teachings of Jesus still direct our foot-

steps should we care to listen and follow. McCabe again reminds us that 'Christmas is the power of God in action." One other thing. The Christmas celebration does not end at midnight on December 25. It continues all year long, and until he comes again. Then too, there will be a new kind of celebration.

So, think about it, There is hope and peace and joy and love in cold December. Yes, cold December does bring warmth to our hearts, our homes, and to our relationships.

Worship in the Park, We went back to Robinson Park this year and a good time was had by all! Thanks for those of you who participated, cooked, brought food, and helped with set-up & clean-up!

**GWOH's - God's Work, Our Hands Sunday**, this year was on Sunday, September 8<sup>th</sup>. We helped Howe, Washington, and Mead Elementary Schools with painting and cleaning projects inside and out, cleaned up a few congregants yards before winter, packed 166 LWR school kits, 131 LWR Health Kits, and 143 Quilts. Lunch was made and desserts were donated! **THANK YOU ALL!** 





LWR Semi Loading - With FELC's 143 quilts, 166 school kits, and 131 health kits, plus we are an in-gathering place for all churches in Central Wisconsin to bring their quilts and kits - the FELC youth and their attending parents loaded 1,163 boxes into the semi-trailer. Thank you!

GLOW God Lights Our Way - The first year with Vicki was a success! With word of mouth, and the children's excitement, this year's attendance has more than doubled. Rhonda took over. Thank you to all the volunteers who help guide and teach the children - this could not happen without you!

Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes, by Samaritan's Purse. This year we collected 102 OCC Shoeboxes, plus fulfilled a match opportunity and was able to order 25 boxes online as well for a grand total of 127 boxes! They will be sent out to children in countries that otherwise might not receive a present. They can also receive the book, The Greatest Gift and can participate in a 12 lesson discipleship course - The Greatest Journey. So, thank you all for bringing in a shoebox and showing a child the gift of Jesus Christ, our Savior! The drop-off location gathered a total of 1,830 shoeboxes from 15 churches!





Stuff the School Bus - From July thru August 3rd we collect school supplies along with the United Way of South Wood and Adams Counties. The supplies are collected, taken down to Lunch by the River and stuffed into an actual school bus, and then given out at Stuff the Desk at Lincoln at a later date in August to students who might not otherwise be able to get school supplies. If your family is in need of this help you must register for school supplies at the United Way in your area.

#### This Christmas season we have several projects going...

**Christmas Food Baskets** - we will be offering 27 food baskets to families of Howe Elemen tary School, and FELC.

The Agape Christmas Tree - as this tree gets decorated each week in December money is raised for our Agape Fund here at FELC. This fund helps local people in need.

**Charlie Brown Christmas Tree** - families from FELC, that could use a little help, will receive gifts from our Charlie Brown Tree. Watch for tags on the CBCT on Sunday 12/8

### **Christian Symbols**



ADVENT COLORS — One of the season's symbolic colors is blue, representing hope. During Advent, we wait in hope to celebrate again God's coming in human form. We also look forward in hope to Christ's coming in glory at the end of the age. Purple symbolizes the royalty of Jesus, the coming Prince of Peace, and the penitence with which we receive him. Some congregations also use pink or white candles in Advent wreaths, with pink symbolizing joy and white symbolizing the Christ Child.


Grief counselor Alan Wolfelt explains that walking alongside — "companioning" — one who grieves "is not about assessing, analyzing, fixing or resolving another's grief. Instead, it is about being totally present to the mourner, even being a temporary guardian of [his or] her soul."

Among Wolfelt's 11 tenets for "companioning the bereaved":

- It's about being present to another person's pain, not taking it away.
- It's about listening with the heart, not analyzing with the head.
- It's about walking alongside, not leading.

"You've seen the darkness earth can hold, the sorrow, war and fear; but God has sent his Son for all, to show his Love is here.


"The darkness can't put out God's Light. Christ's with us day by day, illuminating paths so we can follow in his way."
